

Stewardship Update

We have received a few more pledges since our report in the January Herald. We now have 52 pledges for \$146,422, or 91.5 percent of our pledge goal. This is positive news, and we are very grateful to those who have made a financial commitment to support our church and its vital mission and ministry.

If you have not yet pledged, please be one of those who will help push us over the top. Remember our pledge goal does not cover all the financial needs of Hanover. We still have to draw on reserves in order to pay all of the bills, so it is very important for us to receive our pledge goal of \$155,000 to be able to implement our current budget plan.

Every gift is valuable and every pledge to Hanover is a pledge supporting mission, because Hanover is mission. Each of our pledges is an example of God's love and justice in our lives and in our community.



Treasurer's Corner

Our 2011 deficit of \$26,000 was \$19,000 less than we budgeted and \$15,000 less than 2010!

Lower than budgeted 2011 contributions were offset by memorial contributions and income from the rental of the C.E. building. Even though contributions were below budget, they were still greater than in 2010!

Lower heating and electricity costs, a \$4,500 reduction in the Faith and Action budget, lower pastors' continuing education and travel expenses, and other lower personnel costs also reduced the deficit.

Heating costs were lower as we discontinued the gas budget plan with Delmarva and received a credit in December for money already collected from us in anticipation of 2012 heating season costs. This credit also covered our January, 2012 heating costs, so both 2011 and 2012 heating expense will be unusually low. Future heating and electricity expense will reflect actual usage.

In 2011 we received \$2,241 to-ward our \$7,765 Per Capita expense. This was less than the \$3,000 we budgeted, but more than we received in 2010. 2012 Per Capita is \$28.18 per member, and our 2012 expense will be \$5,946. Hanover members are encouraged to contribute toward this expense.

The Christmas Joy offering totaled \$888, \$87 less than in 2010.

Ray Kirkpatrick has again offered to audit the 2011 church books.

The Finance Committee will update the 2012 budget for Session's review in February.

2011 UnGifts Report

Faith in Action raised over \$1900 for worthy projects during the Christmas season through Hanover's UnGifts project. UnGifts choices this year were the Hanover Food Pantry, Kiva microloans, New Castle County Habitat for Humanity, Heifer, and the Delaware Center for Horticulture.

Twenty-four households or indi-(including three Hanover's children, who donated to the Heifer project) purchased Un-Gifts to pass on to friends or family; the average gift per project was \$50 and the average amount per giver (not counting the \$1 from each of the children) was \$80. Close to half gave to more than project. This year's most popular project was Hanover's own Food Pantry, which received almost \$750 and was selected by 16 of those who purchased Un-Gifts. Church of the Covenant Mission: EDGE Ministry

Following the model set last year by First & Central, the loose offering collected at our joint worship on New Year's Day was committed to go to a local mission of Session's choosing. Elder Nancy Long suggested we choose a ministry of the Church of the Covenant as the recipient. The suggestion was met with enthusiastic approval, and Session voted to send the funds (\$160) to the Church of the Covenant for its EDGE Ministry, which serves the local community in Edgemoor Gardens (EDgemoor Gardens Empowerment).

This ministry is reaching out to Covenant's neighbors in Edgemoor Gardens; serving to inspire, empower and equip residents to transform their lives and their community.

Beginning in February, Church of the Covenant will open its doors two afternoons a week to provide a free after-school program for Edgemoor children in grades K-5 who attend school at Mount Pleasant Elementary, directly adjacent to the church building. EDGE: After-School for Kids offers a safe place for kids to go on Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons (3:30-5:30) to have fun with their friends, get their homework finished and learn and build social relationships through Christian-based stories, music, art and drama.

Volunteer helpers are needed. These are exciting times for Church of the Covenant as its members "step out of the conventional box" and implement and explore new ministry opportunities for their church within the local community. This spring, New Directions Early Head Start will again be using two rooms in the education wing of the church for their home based socialization program. We have four dates scheduled for March. This program is based at the University of Delaware and it is designed for children and their parents to come together with child-care professionals and develop positive ways to play and interact. The focus is on children from 1 month to 3 years of age.

Hanover will also be hosting two work groups coming to Wilmington to support the important services of Habitat for Humanity. In March, we will host approximately 30 students from the University of Pittsburgh, and in April, we will host another 30 students and advisors from a high school in New Jersey.
