Sharing Our Space

Hanover's building is truly a "Gathering Place." In addition to all the activities of our Hanover members, there are many outside groups using space on a regular basis – some weekly, some monthly, and some more than once a week. We also have special occasion requests for social activities or meetings, or for furniture and equipment, and often we have the "out-of the-blue" unpredictable requests for space. Sometimes the requests are inconvenient and rushed. Often the groups or individuals who want to use our Hanover building do not have funds to pay for the space.

Good grief! Someone needs to schedule, coordinate and deal with all of this! We now have a revived building use committee serving under the property committee. Our group consists of Andrea McCoy-Carty, Tom Baker, Ellen Casson, Melvin Matthews, and Andy Jacob. Jill McCracken has been a valuable consultant on an as-needed basis.

Our committee recently revised the Building Use Application, to simplify it, address security concerns, and change some of the fees. We also addressed some procedural issues and Session approved the changes at its February meeting.

One procedural note: "no chairs, tables, or other furnishings belonging to the church will be loaned or rented for use off church grounds." This has been part of our building use procedures for several years, but many members are not aware of it. The group that originally drew up the procedures felt Hanover could not afford the replacement of lost or damaged items, and our current committee feels we should continue this practice.

One of our most important tasks is balancing the security of our building, its furnishings and equipment, the safety of the occupants, *Please turn to Page 3*

Session Adopts Policy Welcoming Civil Unions

As of Jan. 1 Civil Unions became legally recognized relationships in the state of Delaware. This means that same gender couples "who enter into a civil union will enjoy the same rights, protections and obligations that exist for married spouses."

For nearly 30 years Hanover has been committed to equal treatment and opportunity for people of all sexual orientations and identities in the church and in the world. As such the Session affirmed that Civil Unions will be joyously celebrated at Hanover Church. In addition, it was also affirmed that the process for Civil Unions (pre-union coun-

Lent and Healing

What's New with the MAP Team?

Your MAP Team has divided itself to focus on accomplishing some tasks — some that are more immediate and others that are longer-term goals. One part of the team will be concentrating on the community organizing connections with outside groups. The other part of the team is focused on communication and outreach in ways that will be more visible to Hanover members and to people who might be using our church building, or who might be seeking a church home such as Hanover.

One example — you may notice a few new signs around outside the church to help with directions for the use of all of our doors. Hanover does have a few doors and it is not always easy for the uninformed to figure out which door to use. More signs are to come — both outside and in.

We are also working on the directory and hope to make it more comprehensive and include email addresses. The directory will always be a work in progress, as contact info changes constantly, but we will make an effort to keep up. You can help by checking your copy of the directory to see how you are listed. What changes are needed in your contact information? You can call the church office and leave information about what should be changed or you can use the Connection Card in the bulletin to make corrections or additions.

Treasurer's Corner

The Finance Committee (Tim Arnold, Ellen Casson, Ralph Fortney, Andy Jacob, Ray Kirkpatrick, Jeff Long, and Tom Baker) met in January and updated the 2012 budget, which Session approved in February.

The revised 2012 budget has a deficit of \$25,000, slightly less that the \$28,000 deficit forecast in the fall of 2011. Our reserves to cover future deficits are anticipated to be \$87,000 at the end of 2012.

The budget includes \$155,000 for pledge offerings, a 7 percent increase over 2011. We have received \$152,000 in pledges to date, and anticipate pledges to reach the \$155,000 goal. The budget was approved with the understanding that if we do not receive \$155,000, we will reduce benevolence payments to General Assembly and Faith in Action by \$1,000 each. At this point pledge receipts are about on budget.

2012 utility costs are expected to be \$6,500 lower than usual due to the credit built up under the Delmarva budget plan in 2011. 2013 utility costs are expected to return to more normal higher levels. The lower utility costs partially offset the cost of replacing the flat roof on the Jefferson Street side of the sanctuary. The total cost of the roof repair was \$13,700; but we were able to cover \$7,349 of that cost with uncommitted funds remaining in the maintenance reserve from the boiler repair funds contributed in the past. We increased the 2012 budget to cover anticipated costs of repairing the heating controls in the education building, where we are unable to maintain the heat at a comfortable level. The other major change in the budget is a 6 percent increase in our insurance costs.

2012 Per Capita expense is \$28.18 per member. Hanover's per capita cost is \$5,946. Last year \$2,241 was contributed toward per capita expense.

Session also changed the policy of limiting committee chairs to a \$500 expense approval limit before requiring separate Session action. Committee chairs may now authorize expenses within their unspent approved budget. This primarily affects the Property Committee and eliminates the need for separate Session approval of expenses above \$500 if there are unspent budgeted funds.

Ray Kirkpatrick is in the process of auditing the 2011 accounting records.
