
As president of the Female Harmony Society, I would like to thank all who gave so generously to this campaign. Two years ago, when we

FINANCE REPORT

At the October Session meeting, we reviewed the treasurer's report through the end of August 2016 (67 percent of the year). Our combined pledged and unpledged regular income has totaled \$114,572, which is 68 percent of the budget goal for the year. The current regular expenses exceed our income by approximately \$720. We budgeted \$3,800 for our 2016 per capita goal. We have received \$2,728 toward that goal. In 2016, Hanover has paid \$5,887 in per capita to support its connections with the work of the Presbyterian Church all around the world. All of our Hanover members can support those wider connections by paying their per capita (\$31.65 per member), which offsets the cost to Hanover.

The Finance Committee met in October to prepare the first draft of Hanover's budget for 2017. Our biggest challenge continues to be balancing our building maintenance expenses with our desire to compensate our personnel in a way that values their work and their professional contributions to Hanover and to the community. We will be working with Session and members of our committees, to find the best balance. —Ellen Casson, chair of finance

Female Harmony Society Offers Marybelle Enslen Memorial Scholarship

A memorial scholarship award was created in 2015, through a financial gift made in honor of Marybelle Enslen, by her husband, Gerry, and her children, Nancy Mathewson, David Enslen, and Donald Enslen. Marybelle, a devoted member of the Female Harmony Society, died Dec.30, 2014, at the age of 93.

She believed in the power of education to improve lives, particularly continuing education beyond high school and college. One of the legacies of the Female Harmony Society is its commitment to education and helping those who might not otherwise be able to continue their education. We are grateful to the Enslen family for making this scholarship possible.

There will be one scholarship given per year, in the amount of \$1,000. The scholarship will be for a post-graduate program leading to a degree or professional certification that will improve the lives of others. The yearly time frame is from January to January, with the opening of the application process on Nov. 1 of the preceding year, and the closing date on Dec. 15. The award decision will be made by Jan. 15.
