Again this year, Hanover's Faith in Action has wrapped the trees along the streets beside the church. The wraps were inspired by monks in Thailand, who in the 1990s adapted the traditional ceremony that is used to ordain Buddhist monks to help local villagers make a commitment to protect the environment. The cloth represents monks' robes; as the monks are ordained and of God, and not to be harmed, so are the trees.

Monks in Thailand continue to call attention to environmental degradation, acting to preserve vanishing forests, watersheds, and wildlife. Large areas of old growth forest—trees hundreds of years old—have been saved. When the king of Thailand celebrated the 60th anniversary of his coronation in 2006, he asked people all over the country to ordain old trees in his honor.

Hanover Gets a Sexton

At the regular monthly meeting of the Session, in response to the Sexton hiring team's recommendation, the elders unanimously approved calling Herman Pulliam as Hanover's next Sexton. Herman's vocational experience, service to (and deep

Experience Hope

Dear Diary,
Happy Easter!
The tomb is empty!
He is Risen!
Alleluia!

I wanted this to be the first thing you hear from me this time because I'm still rejoicing in the good news and the celebration from a couple of weeks ago. Pastor keeps telling us, "Easter is a season!", and I think I'm finally starting to believe it, and even beginning to feel that way!

When I re-read what I wrote last time I realized how desperate it sounded. I don't regret what I wrote about all the bad things happening in the world, and I don't deny it was the truth about how I felt when I wrote it, but I realize now that it was partly the result of being in the midst of Lent. I had followed Jesus into the wilderness, and then found out how much I could relate to his fear and temptation.

Now that I've had the Easter experience, I have not just more perspective, but more hope. God is so wise about how the seasons work together. Before fully understanding the empty cross and tomb, we first have to experience the wilderness. I had to stand at the mouth of the empty tomb to realize that you always have the last word; and that

When the disciples finally realized what had happened, they were freed from their grief, confusion, anxiety and fear. Because the tomb no longer held Jesus, they were able to let go of all of the things that would inhibit them from following the risen Christ. God gives us Easter so that we might experience here and now what it promised forevermore: new hope and new life.

Yes, dear diary, there is still so much wilderness in the world. Yet, more than ever, I believe in God's power to fill us by emptying us, in this season and in all of our seasons to come. Alleluia, and may it be so ... Peace, *Andy*

FINANCE REPORT

At the April Session meeting, the treasurer's report through the end of February 2017 (16 percent of the year) was reviewed. Our combined pledged and unpledged regular income totaled \$41,760, which is 24 percent of the budget for the year. The current regular income exceeds expenses by approximately \$5,212.

On behalf of Hanover and the finance committee, Ray Kirkpatrick and Ellen Casson attended a meeting with a financial advisor to discuss investment options. The finance committee will be meeting in May to review the recommendations.—*Ellen Casson*

Date Change for Book Discussion Group

Due to a scheduling conflict, Hanover's Book Club will meet on Wednesday, May 31 at 5:30 (rather than May 10) to discuss *White Rage: The Unspoken Truth of Our Racial Divide,* by Carol Anderson. We will still plan to have a soup and salad supper along with the discussion.

We hope you will join us as we reflect upon some of the powerful and negative reactions to the progress of African-Americans in our country that have impacted and limited that progress. Anderson suggests that "white rage" is at work. When African Americans have made progress, white reaction has rolled back some of their gains. The book looks at the Black Codes and Jim Crow; the Supreme Court's 1954 Brown v. Board of Education decision, the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Voting Rights Act of 1965. Looking at this compelling and dramatic history adds a new dimension to our national and indeed our local conversations about race.

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
