## FINANCE REPORT

At the May Session meeting, the treasurer's report through the end of March 2017 (25 percent of the year) was reviewed. Our combined pledged and unpledged regular income totaled \$56,361, which is 32 percent of the budget goal for the year. This is very good news, as is the fact that the per capita income is 33 percent of our budgeted amount. Our regular expenses exceeded our income by approximately \$5,348. One reason is that the per capita was paid, which is \$5,855.

The finance committee met in May to review information received from a professional financial adviser regarding investment options. The committee is presenting a recommendation for Session consideration at its June meeting. The committee consensus is that investing some of Hanover's funds in a balanced stock and bond portfolio is the best way to grow Hanover's assets and invest in the long-term future of the church. — *Ellen Casson*

## Supporting Refugees


