goal at 58% of the year. We also turned the corner in July and ended up in positive territory with regular income exceeding regular expenses by approximately \$6,063. This may not last long, since there are some pretty big expenses on the horizon related to property needs. Session approved the expenditure of over \$5,000 to replace two valves on the boiler. The valves are old and rusted and we had a couple of chilly Sunday mornings in the sanctuary last winter because the valves did not open and close properly. Our July balance sheet reflects a total equity of \$220,252. —Ellen Casson
