Gathering Place Project Gets a \$50,000 Grant

We have some exciting news and encouraging updates to share! Through the combined efforts of Hanover Church and Jefferson Street Center, Inc. (JSC), the Longwood Foundation has awarded JSC \$50,000 to be used for major improvements in the Gathering Place.

The project (detailed in the drawing at left) would include two handicapped-accessible bathrooms, a custodian closet with a mop sink, and a new and larger Food Pantry.

This news of this grant is a great affirmation for all the hard work it has taken and for the vision that it represents.

The Longwood funds have been designated contingent upon our raising the rest of the cost of the work—estimated at \$144,350—and we have been given until November 2020 to do so. We are very well positioned to raise the necessary \$94,350 before the end of 2019. We have \$30,000 total in hand from Chichester DuPont and Crystal Trust foundations. We have a request for \$50,000 pending with the Welfare Foundation and we feel confident that we will receive some positive news from the board in June. The Crestlea Foundation invited us to reapply in September for \$20,000 in grant funds. We have also applied to the Presbyterian Women's Birthday Offering Grant. We will hear their decision in September.

And that is only part of the good news! We have also made progress on the gym renovations. The new wall mats are in place! A few finishing touches are needed, including base molding and molding to cover the metal braces and screws at the top of the mats. A Neighborhood Building Blocks grant covered that cost. The larger and more costly part of the project to install a sprinkler system and upgrade the entire fire alarm protection panel and the new wiring, that allows it to connect with the sprinkler system, is pending additional funding. We have a request into Christiana Care for funding *Continued on Page 3*

FROM THE PASTOR'S STUDY

A Declaration Of Nonviolence

Violence shall no more be heard in your land, devastation or destruction within your borders; you shall call your walls Salvation, and your gates Praise. —Isaiah 60:18

Imagine a city where everyone strives to practice nonviolence, where all our institutions teach and promote nonviolence, and where violence no longer runs rampant. This is our vision. This is our work.

The "our" in these statements is the Nonviolent Cities Project of Campaign Nonviolence. It is a national movement in which cities declare themselves nonviolent; 50 cities are already working toward this commitment and declaration.

For more than a year I have been working with a group of people to become a nonviolent city. Here is the mission for Nonviolent Wilmington:

In Nonviolent Wilmington, poverty, hunger, homelessness, and inadequate education and health care will not be tolerated because our standards of human decency will not allow them. Disputes will be resolved through peaceful conflict resolution and reconciliation, rather than violence, incarceration, and isolation from the community.

To achieve this goal, we will harness the many streams of human possibility into a river of peace: humanist and religious thought—political and educational institutions —economic and business institutions—government and the criminal justice system—and the endless creativity of the peace-loving heart.

The plan is to publicly pronounce Nonviolent Wilmington on the last day of the 4th Annual Peace Week. On Sunday, Sept. 29 at 4 p.m. at the Wilmington Friends Meeting House the organizations and individuals who have made the commitment to nonviolence will gather to proclaim our dedication to the way of peace. Between now and then, organizers are traveling the city to gather organizational and individual commitments to the movement; our goal is to collect 1,000.

At Hanover the Faith in Action Committee is taking the lead in presenting this to members in the congregation and organizations in our area. The Session has voted Hanover's commitment, as has the 9th Ward Interfaith Coalition. If you are interested, I would be thrilled to provide additional information and talk with you about your commitment.

Over the next months you will be hearing much more about this movement in worship, forums, and additional events. Our hope is that Hanover would be one of the leaders in making this powerful statement that, for us, is rooted in the life and teachings of our Christ.

May God bless the nonviolence we practice, and that which it produces . . .

Food Pantry attendance on the rise. For the past month, the number of clients coming to the Food Pantry has been increasing. We usually have about 35-40 families each week which represents about 60 individuals. That number has been steadily increasing since the beginning of the year. The month of May has seen our count go to 45 – 50 families representing over 100 individuals. Each week our shelves are depleted. Your donations are greatly appreciated. We need to get approval from the Historical Commission to place the compressor on the flat roof on the Baynard side of the church, but once that is done, we will be able to move forward. We may need to suffer through a couple more months of hot weather, but air conditioning will happen! This is a tribute to all those who have pledged to support Hanover as it serves it congregation and its community. We have more than \$127,000 in pledges and have \$84,000 in hand to move forward.
