In response to the coronavirus, Governor John Carney issued a state of emergency on Thursday, March 12. How perfect for the superstitious, as it went into effect on Friday the 13th. On that day our lives changed on a proverbial dime. Shopping only for necessities. No more gatherings. Stay-at-home work and school. Stores and restaurants closed. Masks. Six feet. A whole new way of life was born.

A couple of weeks ago we marked the 6th month anniversary of our state of isolation. Or, as I've come to call it, our forced transformation. Given the restrictions imposed by the order, we could have put things on hold, kicked up our feet up, and planned for extra leisure activities that were suddenly possible. After all, what better excuse to slow down than a state of emergency? It is the perfect rationale to put the brakes on.

Well, let me tell you about a community of faith where the state of emergency has not been a license to step back, but a call to step forward. There has been no moss gathering on the Hanover rolling stone! Through the first six months of the pandemic:

- the construction throughout the building has continued; the air conditioning is complete, the Gathering Place will be complete within the week, and the kitchen was completed last month;
- the Session, Deacons and committees have continued to meet and plan for events, programs, and ministries that will continue to operate well beyond our "re-opening" for worship;
- not only that, the virus has provided the space for creativity in how we respond to being separated did you catch that Deacons' event last week?;
- our youth continue to meet every week with members of the Faith in Action committee to push us forward in our focus on earth care, especially as the Session has approved their request to lead us into becoming a recognized Earth Care Congregation with the denomination;
- the prayer circle continues to meet every Monday morning (8:30am) to share in prayers for those who have requested them, with Zoom technology what better time to try it out?;
- Herman and Twyla continue to amaze, not just by keeping up, but by accomplishing many tasks that had continued to be on the back burner;
 - the sanctuary is now wired for the internet so live streaming of our services is just on the horizon;
- and the giving...the generosity and commitment of the Saints financially has not missed a beat we continue to run at or very close to our projected budget for contributions!;
 - and the list goes on...

Oh, wait, one more thing. Six months ago, on March 19, I wrote this in the Flash: "In the effort to add some levity, perspective, and meaning to our journey through the coronavirus wilderness, I have made the commitment to not trim my beard until the CDC tells us it is safe to gather ... May it be for us a symbol of the growth that cannot be stunted; that, like the love of God, never stops - especially while in the wilderness." (continued on page 2)

The twists and turns of life mean we sometimes wind up in unexpected places. So, how did I wind up at Hanover? Would you believe it all started when I was less than a week old?

My parents loaded up their three children into the car and we went to church every Sunday—even my very first Sunday, when I was just four days old! I followed in my parents' footsteps, going to church every Sunday and becoming actively involved in the life of the church. I began to sense a call to ministry in early 2001, shortly after my 30th birthday. My mother and I were walking in the cathedral in Cologne, Germany and talking about how those craftsmen spent a good part of their career building a church they would never see completed. I thought about that for the rest of our trip and I realized that is what we are called to do as Christians—working together to build a church we will never complete in this life. I felt called to be a part of that building in a new and deeper way.

When I got home to the Washington, DC area, I started to explore seminaries and the process for ordination. But life got in the way, and then September 11th happened. Much like the shifts we are all experiencing now as a result of this pandemic, life in Washington, DC changed dramatically in the months following the attacks. I missed my family and wanted to find a way to spend more time with them. I left my job and moved to Wilmington in February 2002 to help my aunt as she cared for my aging grandparents. As a bonus, I met Chip, now my husband of 17 years, on the first day of work at my new job.

My grandfather remained healthy and strong until his death in 2016, just after his 102nd birthday. Soon after, Chip and I talked about my call to ministry and I started to make plans for seminary. Midway through my second year, my pastor at First & Central recommended I contact Pastor Andy about an internship at Hanover Church. I did, and at the beginning of the pandemic shutdown last spring, you Hanover Saints responded to a season of uncertainty by offering an opportunity for a wonderful learning experience.

We are all on a similar journey, spanning years and miles as we grow in faith and in the understanding of who and whose we are. And our journeys continue every day as we work together to build the church we will never complete in this life. Thanks be to God!

I would like to introduce you or reintroduce you to a stalwart of Hanover Church Peg Showalter. Peg has been a member here for 63 years! She and her late husband, Bill, started at

Hanover in 1958. But I get ahead of myself.



Peg was born in Coatesville, Pennsylvania and went to college in Danville, Virginia at Averett College to prepare to be a secretary. After college she moved to Wilmington and started her career at DuPont in 1954. Peg met Bill and got married in 1957. They became members of Hanover in 1958 when they joined a new member class of 25 people! They loved the young couples club and really enjoyed the people and the church service. After 5 years at Dupont, Peg and Bill had their first child, David, in 1960. Two other children came soon after: Karen in 1963 and Bruce in 1967. Peg has five grandchildren and one great granddaughter!

Peg and Bill were very active members of Hanover. Bill, who worked as an accountant, was a member of Session and was involved in selling the church manse to Lorie and Bill Tudor. Bill passed away in 1993 from lung cancer. Peg has kept herself busy being a "professional volunteer". She volunteered driving for the FISH organization for 48 years. Her Hanover activities includes: Session, Clerk of Session, choir member, moderator of the nominating committee, deacon, moderator of deacons, Female Harmony Society member, and moderator for Presbytery women!

In the 1970's, Peg was involved with a catering group called the Flair Foods! She worked with Peg Green, Thelma Meginniss, and Eleanor Loose. They started with a wedding reception and continued catering for over 8 years. Peg said it was a success as they learned how to cook in volume and made their food at home and brought it to the catering jobs.

Today she has lived in Maris Grove in Pennsylvania for the last 13 years. She is still a faithful member on Sunday mornings (before Covid-19). Peg is enjoying her time playing table games and being with friends. Peg was volunteering there escorting people to the hair salon. She truly is a "pro" in helping other people!






A Treasure From the Past . . .

We received photos of a pocket-sized New Testament bible that belonged to Mary Elizabeth Taylor, who received it from Hanover Sunday School when she was 9 years old in 1926. Her daughter Catherine Gastinger Briggs wrote us about this family treasurer because her mother had used it in her lifetime, writing on the pages, and Catherine wanted us to know how much she loved the bible and the connection to Hanover. Her mother Mary was born and raised in Wilmington, living at 1622 Lincoln Street, which was a little over a mile away from the church. After high school, she traveled to Baltimore and graduated from Mount Sinai Hospital's nursing program. She became a pediatric nurse and was a pediatric nurse for the rest of her life until she passed in 1974, at 56 years of age.


