Dear Hanover Saints,

Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of old.

I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?

Isaiah 43:18-19

Have you ever wondered...the prefix "septem" in Latin means seven. So, as we enter this new month – the ninth in the year – why is it called September? Well, only because you asked...blame the Romans! When they first developed a calendar of their own, September was the 7th month. When additional months were added to the annual calendar, somehow the name September stuck. Funny how once something is created and named, it becomes so difficult to change. As much as we may like new things, how often is it that we are resistant to receiving them?

Lest we be critical, have you ever wondered why our spiritual home is called Hanover Street Presbyterian Church? If our letterhead is correct, we're located at 1801 North Jefferson Street, at the intersection of 18th St., N. Jefferson St., and Baynard Blvd. As the young people ask: "What's up with that?"

Hanover Presbyterian Church was founded as Second Presbyterian Church on October 24, 1772. Turns out that beginning in 1831 the Hanover saints became truly Hanover saints when we moved to the corner of what was then Hanover Street (now 6th St.) and King Street. It was named after the street because the congregation could not agree on any other name!

When our forebears moved to 18th St. and Baynard Blvd. in 1908, once again there was no inspiration for a new name. In addition, we had established a reputation throughout the city – so why risk the confusion of changing our name? After all, while on Hanover Street, we had the largest church building in Wilmington! So, there you have it – why we continue to be the Hanover saints.


In 2022 we will celebrate 250 years of ministry, mission, and service in Wilmington. I would offer that the history of Hanover is a history of one new thing after another – throughout next year we will be hearing much more about the many legacies in our history. And yet...

As so many new things have been created, and so many things have been renewed, the character, purpose, and resolve of the Hanover saints have remained constant for 250 years. What a glorious irony: the one thing that has not changed is our willingness to change; to pursue the ways in which God continues to do "a new thing" in our midst.



Hanover Book Discussion: *The Nickel Boys*

Our next Book Discussion is **Sunday, September 19 at 4 PM** on **Zoom**. Folks can join by computer, tablet, iPad, or telephone. Let the church office know how you will be joining so that we can get you the right way to participate.

We have one copy of the book in the Church Office available for borrowing. The book is widely available: local libraries, local book stores, and Amazon.



Why we should read this book . . .

Colson Whitehead won his second Pulitzer Prize for Fiction for *The Nickel Boys.* (The first was for *The Underground Railroad*, which we should also read someday.)

Despite being fiction, this book tells the whole truth about a Florida Reform School that treated its young black prisoners brutally and sometimes secretly killed them. The Dozier School, as it was called, was founded in 1900 and was not closed until 2011. When I lived in Florida during the 1980s and '90s, some of the worst abuses at this facility and similar ones were being exposed and supposedly stopped. It is hard to understand why the state did not close the school immediately, considering what was known at the time. In addition to the cemetery on the property, researchers from the University of South Florida in 2012 found 55 unmarked graves nearby. In 2018, damage from Hurricane Michael revealed 27 "anomalies" on the property that are being investigated as possible burial sites.

The Nickel Boys is not just a catalog of horrors, it is also a story of a few of the fictional residents and how their different personalities coped with what was happening to them. We should read this book to remind ourselves that we must always pay attention to what is happening when persons in power are responsible for a vulnerable population, such as children. We must continue to demand accountability from those who would rule the lives of others.

For those of us concerned about the violence in Wilmington and other places, for all who long for a more just society, for all who appreciate creative approaches to how we can foster a more peaceful personal life, Peace Week Delaware (PWD) has something for us! A mere seven days could not contain PWD; nine days are needed for the 60 events in three counties.

If you want to see the full range of events, go to peaceweekdelaware.org. There you will be able to view all the events, by calendar or by a list. You may very well find events near you and that also appeal to you.

Hanover's event will take place on the last day, October 10, from 1:30 to 3:15 pm. We plan to offer the event both by Zoom and in-person (now referred to as "hybrid") in order to meet the COVID prevention needs of all participants. The situation seems to change frequently, so how the event will take place could change. If you attend in person, please bring a mask.

Our event is titled "Lessons from COVID" and will be about sharing our stories and experiences from the time of COVID, and how our faith traditions or other guiding principles have shaped our understanding of what has been happening to all of us.

As soon as our event ends, we can just cross 18th St. if we want to participate in the closing event of PWD, the (almost) annual March for a Culture of Peace. Stepping off at 3:30, the March will move at a slow pace. Even though the March is outside, we recommend having a mask for those times that we might be bunched together. Even those of us who are fully vaccinated need to be concerned about the protection of others, including children.

Creation Care Matters ECOPLASTICS UPDATE

After collecting plastic for about a month and a half, Hanover dropped off 14 pounds of number 2, number 4, and number 5 plastic to EcoPlastics Delaware to be recycled. We are hoping to drop off twice as much next time, so please bring us your plastic.

There have been several questions asked about this project, so here are some answers.

Why should plastic be recycled? Half of all plastic manufactured becomes trash in less than a year. Only 9% of that is being recycled. It is estimated that <u>8 million metric tons of plastic ends up in the oceans every year</u>. That is the equivalent to five grocery bags of plastic trash for every foot of coastline around the globe.

Why can't I just put the plastic in my recycling can? About 25% of what goes into your recycling can isn't recycled due to contamination.

What about plastic bags? Number 2 and number 4 bags can be recycled. Many bags don't have a number on them, but you can bring them, as most plastic bags are recyclable. If you want to start small, start with plastic bags as they can't go in your recycling can, and Ecoplastics will make sure they get recycled into something useful.

How long will Hanover be collecting plastic? We plan to keep this as an ongoing project, part of our work as a Earth Care Congregation.

I'm not coming to church in person yet, how can I drop off my plastic? You can drop the plastic off any time the church is open. Just ring the bell on the Jefferson St. entrance. Better yet, bring it between 11 a.m. and 1 p.m. on Tuesday and stay for lunch at J. B.'s Café.


Looking ahead in October . . .
