What's Happening

Food Pantry – Hanover's Food Pantry will again be partnering with the BTL Foundation to provide 100 turkeys and bags of food for Thanksgiving this year. **Needed food donations** are canned **vegetables**, **cranberry sauce**, **stuffing mix and gravy and pies**. As in previous years, we will be meeting in the Gathering Place after church on Sunday, November 21 to fill the bags for distribution on Monday, Nov. 22.

Clothing Closet — When the state of emergency was declared in March 2020, we closed down the weekly Wednesday operation of our Clothes Closet. Although it remains closed to this day, we rejoice in reporting that re-opening is now on the near horizon.

Resuming our ministry that responds to Matthew's command to "clothe the naked" has taken extra time because of the renovations in the Gathering Place. In its previous incarnation, the Clothes Closet occupied the majority of the Gathering Place all the time. One of the hopes and goals of renewing the Gathering Place was that it would be feasible and easy to host a large variety of ministries and programs, especially ones that involved our established partner, the Jefferson Street Center.

In the spirit of that partnership, a task group was formed with members from Hanover and JSC to discuss, discern, and then propose a way to continue the Clothes Closet while also ensuring that the space would remain flexible and available for other groups. By the grace of God, that group is in its' final stages and preparing to present a proposal to the Board of Directors of JSC and the Hanover Session. In short, the "footprint" during the week for the Clothes Closet will be greatly reduced by having racks and tables on wheels so each week they can be stored in a smaller area. In preparation for opening each week, the racks will be spaced throughout the room for the time the Closet is open, and then consolidated again when it closes. Watch for updates about the specific opening date for the Clothing Closet!

Refugee family support—Hanover has joined in with various other congregations in receiving and sponsoring an Afghan family. We welcomed a woman and her one year old son, and the father is still in the Middle East but hopes to join them soon. They are in need of furnishings for their apartment. Things will need to be on the smaller side as the apartment is on the third floor and has a narrow stairwell. Here is a message from Bill Getman, who is from First and Central and coordinating our efforts:

Here's what we need: a dress, night stand, several lamps, a small couch, an end table, and a smart TV. I think we have everything for right now, but won't know for sure until we get things set up. As always, gift cards from Target, Walmart, and grocery stores are the most helpful. Thank you!

There will also be a great need for assistance with transportation. Especially in the beginning there will be many appointments and errands involved in getting settled. Only those who have completed a security clearance may be with the family directly. If you are interested in completing the process to be cleared, please call the church office.

There were resource tables set up along Baynard, between 18th and Concord, with activities for children and adults. Hanover and JSC had tables out in front of the church, and the volunteers covering the tables enjoyed interacting with all the folks out and about.

We heard through the grapevine that this was the BEST Open Streets event ever, or could it be that some of us are a bit biased? It surely had variety. There was music playing, weight lifting, children playing chess, jumping rope, bouncing in the bounce house, and riding scooters. The Urban Bike Project was on full display. People were walking their dogs and enjoying meeting people they knew and people they didn't. At the JSC table, we asked children and adults to write down what community means to them. The children seemed especially excited about participating and wrote things like "love" and "a group of nice people" and "people helping others." It was awesome!

Because we experience him nearly every Sunday in worship, likely we have a sense of what Pastor Andy is all about. Many Sundays, when not serving another congregation, Andy's spouse, Nona Holy, is also with us in worship. So, if you have ever wanted to know more about her...



Nona was born in Houston, Texas to an

Exxon accountant and schoolteacher. Because of her dad's job, she also lived in California, Tennessee, and North Carolina in her earliest years. In 3rd grade her family moved back to Houston, where she spent the rest of her academic years. Her passion in high school was leading the production of school plays as a member of the drama club.

She got her undergraduate degree at Trinity University (San Antonio), and then went to Portland, Oregon where she spent a year as a Presbyterian Young Adult Volunteer in Mission. From there she went to McCormick Theological Seminary in Chicago, Illinois where she earned her Master of Divinity degree. From there it was to Parma Heights, Ohio where she was called to serve as an Associate Pastor at Parma South Presbyterian Church.

After serving the congregation for seven years she accepted a call to serve as an Associate Presbyter for Leadership Development in the Presbytery of the Western Reserve (Cleveland, OH). Somewhere, in the midst of all this, Pastor Andy followed her to Cleveland, and they were married.

In 2004 Nona became a full-time mom with the birth of Christopher. In 2008 she gave birth to Jonathan, and six weeks later moved to Wilmington - that's a much longer story! Soon after arriving, she was called to serve as the Presbyterian Campus Pastor of the University of Delaware, fulfilling a long-time dream of working with college age students. She rejoices in that role to this day. Along the way she has also continued to serve other congregations in our Presbytery as a bridge pastor, as well as being the staff associate for the Ignite Committee.

Reducing Our Footprint

For more than a generation, the Hanover saints have been committed to working for ecological justice. Whether you call it earth care or creation care, the goal is the same: to intentionally alter our behaviors and habits in using our natural resources so that we might reduce the level of damage to which we are subjecting God's creation.

Speaking of generations, last year our younger ones initiated and led a process that led to Hanover being designated an Earth Care Congregation with our denomination. The process required research into our current use of energy, and then the creation of a specific comprehensive plan to reduce the church's carbon footprint (the measure of our toll on the earth's resources). The plan was reviewed and approved by the Session, and the approval came last spring.

One of the products of the plan was the completion of an energy audit. In partnership with Delaware Interfaith Power and Light, we underwent a comprehensive audit that examined our energy use in great depth. The result: a thirty-page document that includes specific recommendations to reduce our carbon footprint in both the long and short range – including projected savings in energy costs!

There were four central recommendations; one of them being the conversion of the lighting in the church to LED powered bulbs and tubes. In response, the young adult "green group", our Sexton Herman, the Property Committee, and the Session are already in conversations about how we can begin this conversion.
