Here's the next installment in our Pastoral Transition Update series!

August Session Meeting – Transitional Pastor Discussion

Rev. Cindy Kohlmann (Connectional Presbyter) and Rev. Miriam Foltz (Hanover's liaison with the Presbytery's Committee on Ministers & Congregations) participated in Session's August 16th meeting: Miriam as Moderator and Cindy as discussion facilitator for a major part of the meeting. Discussion focused on questions the Presbytery offered for consideration as well as Elders' answers to questions they had received in June re: what Hanover is looking for in a transitional pastor (qualities, characteristics, full-time, part-time, etc.)

After an extended sharing of ideas, Session approved the next steps in the process:

A full-time transitional pastor – Session recognizes the importance of a pastor's full-time presence to get to know the congregation, address its needs, and foster its growth.
Adopt New Castle Presbytery's recommended minimum salary/benefits amounts
Continue with the full Session as the Transitional Pastor Search Team

Transitional Pastor Candidates

Rev. Kohlmann noted that there are several candidates possible for Hanover.

<u>Session's next step</u> is to take the ideas shared at this meeting and the Elders' June questionnaire answers and create a "Transitional Pastor's Position Description." When drafted, Session will consult with Cindy and Miriam who will then review possible candidates' position descriptions and then suggest possible candidates to Session.

Transitional Pastor Timeline

It is too early in the process to pinpoint when a transitional pastor might arrive at Hanover. However, our Presbytery liaisons, Miriam & Cindy, understand that we are eager to work on and complete this process for the good of our Hanover family!



After church on September 11 we will be discussing *Invisible Child: Poverty, Survival, and Hope in an American City* by Andrea Elliotti(two copies of the book are available in the office). This book is about a girl with an ancestry of slavery, who is facing a homeless crisis, and must guide her siblings. It shows the power of resilience and importance of family. This is a true story which was in *the New York Times*. This is

a long book, but well worth reading! Ayinde Truxon will be leading the discussion.

Then, on November 20, we'll discuss *The Sun Does Shine (two copies of the book are available in the office),* written by a man who spent 30 years in prison on death row for a crime he didn't commit, due to mistaken identity. This is a powerful, revealing story of hope, love, justice, and the power of reading. Maggie Alexander will lead this discussion.

Please join us for interesting and enlightening discussions.

Hanover has always been supportive of mission efforts by Members of Hanover and that continues. There have been questions recently about the Pastor's Discretionary Fund. For the moment, this fund is limited until a Transitional Pastor is hired and an agreement with Session is worked out.

It also seems advisable to remind everyone that any efforts to raise funds for things outside Hanover be taken to Session if the Church or its resources are required. Ongoing arrangements and support will, of course, continue, but we particularly request this step for personal needs.

The office will continue to recommend other resources for support whenever possible.

"Hanover History—Part I"

In about one month, on October 23, 2022, Hanover will celebrate 250 years as a Presbyterian Church. It is a notable milestone and one that deserves celebrating. I have tried to provide various short articles to mark this year. Over the next issues, I want to offer some short thoughts about Hanover and its members in different times. We start this month by considering Hanover during its earliest years. It's tempting to claim that the people of past years are mostly like us. It's partly true in the fact that they strove to act as they felt called by God. They were good and not as good, rich and poor, hard working and less so and so on.

But, the world that many knew is far from our world in 2022. Consider the world around them and how it impacts them. Below are some reflections on Delaware and America in the 1770s, the years of Hanover's founding.

In 1772, there is no United States; there are 13 separately run British Colonies. There is no election of colonial leaders except in rare and local situations. There are approximately 2 to 2 ½ million colonists. There was a range of ethnic groups. About half were of British descent and about 20% were from Africa. We do not really know how many native Americans there were, but we do know that disease and war was taking a heavy toll.

There are only a handful of jobs outside the home. Farming is by far the largest occupation. There are few professionals – doctors and lawyers. The Industrial Revolution is still in the future so the closest kind of job is working in the mills such as found along the Brandywine. These are primarily for grinding wheat and corn. Inside the home, everything is done and done by hand. Making clothes and repairing them is constant. Almost all food is local, Heating is by wood.

Life expectancy varies by area, but is basically under 50 years. Rural areas it may be around 36. Infant mortality is high and many families do not name children until they reach their second year.

In Delaware Episcopalians and Presbyterians are the largest denominations. Other groups exist and will come to pass these two in size. Catholics are largely in Maryland and will grow as the nation grows.

Electricity is little understood and any night lights are mainly by candle. Education is very limited and chiefly provided for boys.

Life is described as brutal, but people strive to make things better. Setting up a new church was not just survival it was incredibly important to their spiritual well being.

Next month, I will attempt to offer some thoughts on 100 years ago and hopefully a few in November about possibilities not just for Hanover, but for organizations like JSC that will walk with Hanover in the time ahead.
