

Join the Discipleship Team for a special World Communion/Peacemaking/Celebrating Sabbath Community Sunday on this Sunday, October 2 at 9:30am. They even found a children's story that sums up all three celebrations in one fun story— Chik Chak Shabbat by Mara Rockliff. Every Friday, Goldie Simcha makes her grandmother's recipe for cholent, a Jewish beef stew, and shares it with everyone in the apartment building. For that is the purpose of Shabbat: togetherness. But when Goldie falls sick one week and cannot make cholent...(come on Sunday to hear the rest of the story!) On Sunday, September 11<sup>th</sup>, we had a very interesting discussion about *Invisible Child* by Andrea Elliott.

Our next book discussion will take place after church on November 20<sup>th</sup>. We will be discussing **The Sun Does Shine: How I Found Life and Freedom on Death Row** by Anthony Ray Hinton and Lara Love Hardin, with a foreword by Bryan Stevenson.

Anthony Ray Hinton was arrested in 1985 for a murder he didn't commit.

He was sentenced to death by electrocution. He spent his first three years on Death Row at Holman State Prison in agonizing silence—full of despair and anger. But as Hinton accepted his fate, he resolved not only to survive but to find a way to live on Death Row. For the next twenty-seven years, he was a beacon—transforming not only his own spirit, but those of his fellow inmates, fifty-four of whom were executed mere feet from his cell. With the help of civil rights attorney and bestselling author of *Just Mercy*, Bryan Stevenson, Hinton won his release in 2015.

Dear Hanover Saints,

Here's a summary of the behind-the-scenes work that has happened since last month's "Pastoral Transition Update."

#### **Transitional Pastor Process**

At its Sept. 20<sup>th</sup> meeting, Session approved the "Transitional Pastor's Responsibilities" list. This list is the result of Elders' questionnaire answers & discussion input over the last couple of months re: what characteristics, abilities, etc., Hanover is looking for in a transitional pastor.

On Sept. 21<sup>st</sup>, the "Responsibilities List" was submitted to New Castle Presbytery. The Presbytery's Committee on Ministers & Congregations (COMC) will review this list and then suggest to Session the names of candidates who may be a good fit as Hanover's Transitional Pastor. After that, Hanover's Session will begin interviewing transitional pastor candidates. As of Sept. 28, Session has not yet received any candidates' names from the COMC.

# Information about voting in Delaware General Election November 8, 2022

A good way to get voting information is the state elections website iVote.de.gov

Voter Registration Information will let you look up your current registration. If you have changed your name or mailing address since the last time you voted, correct your registration information so that the Dept. of Elections will be able to mail your Polling Place card to you.



Delaware now has same-day registration, so you can register when you go to vote. You will need a document or two to prove your correct name and mailing address.

You can also request an Absentee Ballot, which requires a valid excuse. Vote by Mail is mentioned, but for reasons explained later in this article, is not available at the time this is being written.

**Early Voting** will be available for the first time in Delaware. Voting locations called Vote Centers will be open for early voting at least 10 days before the election, ending on Sunday, November 6. DE voters may choose to vote at any Vote Center within the county in which they live. In New Castle County, the Vote Centers are:

#### 2022 dates and times of early voting:

Friday, Oct. 28—Tuesday, Nov. 1 11 AM – 7 PM

Wednesday, Nov. 2—Sunday, Nov. 6 7 AM – 7 PM

November 8 is considered to be Election Day. If you vote on November 8, your polling place card shows your assigned polling place. You can also check your record at iVote.de.gov to find where you vote, or contact your county elections office.

**Vote by Mail** was passed by the legislature and signed into law by Governor Carney. The law was overturned by Delaware Chancery Court on constitutional grounds. As of this writing, Vote by Mail is not available in Delaware. Watch your local news to find out whether Vote by Mail prevails in an appeal in time for the November 8 election.

#### "Hanover History—Part II"

This month, on Sunday October 23, 2022, Hanover will celebrate 250 years as a Presbyterian Church. Last month I offered thoughts on Hanover at its founding. Today, I offer some thoughts on Hanover 100 years ago.

The 1920s will be a different world from the 1770s, and a long way from 2022.

The United States has 48 states and goes from the Atlantic to the Pacific. It also has a number of territories, including Alaska and Hawaii. The population has grown from 2 ½ million. It was just over 106 million in 1920 and just under 123 million in 1930. Life expectancy has also increased from 35 to 45 years to around 53.6 years for men and 54.6 years for women.

The world has survived the "Great War" of 1914 to 1918 and a huge pandemic that killed millions. Women have finally gotten the vote and alcohol may no longer be sold legally in the United States. Universal education is the theory, but there are pockets where it is not present.

The country has grown "isolationist", but is finding a growing influence from its experience in Europe. It still faces racism in the form of Jim Crow laws and groups such as the KKK. The doctrine of "separate but equal" will be challenged, but the biggest changes await the 50s and 60s.

Agriculture is still a huge part of the employment picture, but factory jobs are growing especially because of the Auto Industry. There are a growing range of jobs not imagined in the 1770s that now exist. There is a divide in occupations. Women are usually teachers, nurses, and maids, while men were mostly farmers, doctors, lawyers, and bankers. Economically, things seem amazingly positive, but The Great Depression will hit in October 1929 and last throughout the 1930s.

Electricity means light at night and activity outside the home in things like dance clubs. Radio is the big form of entertainment. T.V. will soon be developed, but movies are the growing source of things to watch. Computers do not yet exist except as concepts. Telephones are appearing everywhere, but only as landlines and many places only have 1 or 2 to a town. When Vice-President Calvin Coolidge is called to be told he is now President, he has to go to the General Store to take the call.

Religion is losing some of its importance as people find other activities outside the home on Sundays.

People would feel things are so much better than 150 years earlier. But 2022 would surpass science fiction in most people's minds.

In another 100 years we have reached 50 states and a population of almost 330 million. The U.S. has come through the 20<sup>th</sup> century with two major World Wars, a "Cold War", and numerous other wars. It has become one of the world's most powerful countries whether it likes it or not.

Hanover has grown, moved, changed over theses 250 years and faces an uncertain future. It is both scary and potentially terrific. I have offered these two "pictures" of times we no doubt found very scary in some ways. But, people did more than just get through them. They took the steps that helped lead to today.

Next month, I will attempt to offer some of those possibilities not just for Hanover, but for organizations like JSC that will walk with Hanover in the time ahead.
